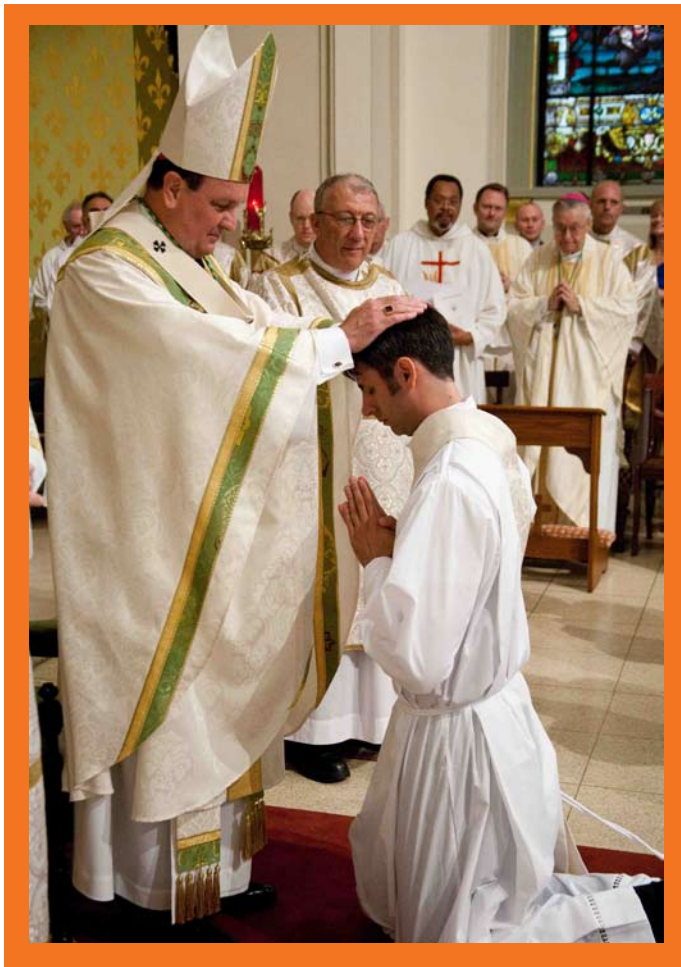

## Dear Friends:

The theme of this issue of the Link, 'Man the Seeker', is based on Jesus' words to His disciples: "So I say to you, ask, and it will be given you; search, and you will find; knock, and the door will be opened for you." (Luke 11:9). These words of Jesus console us with the assurance that we can seek and find God's kingdom, while at the same time they challenge us with the warning that such a supreme gift will only come in response to our earnest striving.

Scripture is clear that our quest for God is itself a response to His grace given to us out of sheer love, and by no merit of our own: 'those whom he predestined, he also called; and those whom he called, he also justified.' (Romans 8:30). In the normal course of life, this call of God comes through ordinary human channels – parents, clergy, religious, and teachers, who instruct us and inspire us in the ways of God.

The Book of Acts gives a beautiful and touching example of the pivotal role played by a teacher in leading a student to seek and find God. The apostle Philip encountered the Ethiopian eunuch who was reading the prophet Isaiah, but without comprehending the meaning of the sacred text. According to St. Luke, Philip found the eunuch reading and, prompted by the Spirit, asked him, "Do you understand what you are reading?" He replied, "How can I, unless someone guides me?" And he invited Philip to get in and sit beside him." (Acts 8: 30-31).

What Philip did for the Ethiopian eunuch is repeated every day at McGill-Toolen! Our teachers and coaches and staff members, prompted by the call of the Spirit, draw near to students to help them understand what they are reading. By sanctifying every day by prayer; by teaching, with conviction and without apology, the entire message of Jesus; by offering opportunities to receive the sacraments; by special events such as retreats; and, by the lived example of faith, our teachers lead our students to seek and find God.

Thank you for your support of our Catholic high school, an oasis in a world which does not know how or where to seek and find God. Please pray for our teachers and staff, that we may have the wisdom of St. Philip in preparing our students for a lifetime of knowing and loving God.

## Campus Ministry is Alive at McGill-Toolen

I find myself occasionally asking the students who come in to see me, "How is your spiritual life?" This of course is a great question that we can all ask ourselves. But as I was preparing this article I thought perhaps the reason our students are so excited about being Catholic is that their faith is not compartmentalized. The Faith permeates everything they do and they immerse themselves in it every day. There isn't a "spiritual life" and their "other life." It is all the same. We all have this desire in our hearts to grow deeper or fall deeper in love with God. We are hard wired to seek Him out. The reason campus ministry is growing is because of the Holy Spirit working in our school. Our students, your children, are seeking out God openly and are excited for what He has in store for them.

We had 170 students voluntarily attend the fall retreat. A student asked me when he arrived, "So what does the schedule look like?" I explained all that we would do including a candlelight Mass Friday night, Mass Saturday morning, adoration of the Blessed Sacrament that night, and Mass Sunday morning. He responded, "We have mass three times and adoration...Cool!" Our weekly Praise and Worship nights have grown to the point that we are bursting out of the chapel. We are once again planning for the March for Life pilgrimage to Washington, D.C. where we will be taking 3 buses with over 100 students. The religion department has inspired a school wide First Friday devotion to the Sacred Heart of Jesus. The students go to confession and attend Mass on the First Friday of every month. I was amazed to walk in to the First Friday Mass and see roughly 600 students present! There is no real secret to success. Just give them Jesus and He will do the rest.

## McGill-Toolen Students' ACT Scores Higher than National Averages

McGill-Toolen has always been known for its excellent academic curriculum. But did you know that McT students in Classes 2010 – 2013, from College Preparatory 1 to Advanced Placement have, on average, scored higher on all subjects on the ACT than students in Alabama and across the nation? McT's student body as a whole scored on average a 23.0 on the ACT, and the upper 1/3 of our students scored an average of 27.7. Compare those scores to the Alabama average of 20.3 and the national average of 21.3.

McGill-Toolen students can attribute much of their success to McT's challenging curriculum and talented teachers. For example, the upper 1/3 of our students scored averages of 29.9 in English, 28.7 in Reading, 26.5 in Math, and 25.9 in Science.

McGill-Toolen faculty and staff make it their mission to educate students and give them the tools they need to get into good colleges and mature into the next generation of leaders. These ACT scores really show their commitment to our students.

## Sports Spotlight: Will Glass



Will began swimming around the age of 5 for a summer league and by 6 was swimming year-round. He currently practices 20 hours per week which includes three mornings before school, getting up at 4:30 AM. The dedication, time commitment, hard work, and self-discipline he has put into his sport is remarkable. He is working toward qualifying this summer for the 2012 Olympic Trials.

He was the 2009 Junior National Champion in the 200 yard Freestyle relay and ranked #11 all-time in US history in 100 yard Butterfly for boys 13-14 age group. In 2010, as a sophomore, he was the Alabama State champion in the 100 yard Butterfly and broke the record that had been held for 25 years! Will has been named City of Mobile Swim Association Swimmer of the Year multiple times and holds 20 individual records at the CMSA. He was a Junior and Senior National Qualifier in multiple events, ranked #2 in the nation in the 100 Butterfly and #2 in the nation in 100 Backstroke. He also ranked in the top 10 in the country 200 Butterfly and 200 Backstroke. We are very excited to see what the future holds for Will!

## 2010 McT Football Season



The 2010 Yellow Jacket Football Season started off with a lot of excitement. They finished 2nd at the National Select 7 on 7 Tournament in Hoover after losing in the championship game vs. Carver in late July. The team started the season ranked 9th in the state and opened our season on national T.V. when we played nationally ranked Evangel Christian out of Shreveport, La. in our Pre-Season game. The Yellow Jackets beat arch-rivals UMS-Wright 41-16 and were ranked as high as #7 in the state. Several key injuries occurred the next 3 weeks as we fell to Fairhope, beat B.C.H.S., and lost to Foley, making the record 2-2 and dropping them from the 6A state rankings. As always, our young men rallied around one another as we defeated #2 ranked Davidson for the second straight year and defending our home field at The LIP. The team went on to defeat Williamson, Satsuma, and Robertsdale, before falling to the eventual 6A State Champions Daphne. This set the stage for the Y'all vs. Us Cellular South "Battle of the Cannon" with our oldest rival Murphy. This would be McT's 2nd nationally televised game of the year on Fox Sports South broadcasted to 13.5 million households. Once again the cannon was painted orange as the Yellow Jackets defeated the Panthers 23-18. This made it the 12th straight year that the McGill-Toolen Catholic High School Football team has made the Class 6A State playoffs and it would be a rematch with the #3 ranked 9-1 Davidson Warriors. Some key 4th quarter turnovers cost our Yellow Jackets a chance at advancing, but the foundation for the future was set. The Yellow Jackets played on National T.V. twice, beat our traditional rivals UMS-Wright, Davidson, and Murphy, and were undefeated at The LIP! We are proud of our young men and the future is bright. It is great to be a Yellow Jacket!!!

## Swim and Dive Team



Congratulations to the Swim and Dive Team for an outstanding performance at the State Meet in Tuscaloosa. Twenty one athletes qualified to compete at State and over half of the athletes finished in the top 16 in their individual events. Sarah Dominick and Will Glass are our

new State Champions. Sarah finished first in the dive competition and Will finished first in the 100 Butterfly. Overall, the men's team took 3rd place and the women's team took 12th place. These accomplishments top another exceptional season.

The women's swim team took four first place finishes and the men's team took five first place finishes out of six regular season meets. Both teams also won the County Championships for the second year in a row. Thanks to everyone who supported the team and we look forward to another great season next year.

## Girls Cross Country

The 2010 girls' Cross Country team continued the success of the 2009 season. The girls' team finished as Runner-Up at the 6A State Championship with an impressive 1st and 3rd finish by Sophomore Carmen Carlos and Junior Sage Blackwell. Carmen



successfully defended her State title and was undefeated in Alabama for the 2010 season. The team started the year with a victory at the UMS/McT Annual Dual meet and quickly followed that up with another victory at the Foley Invitational. The Lady Jackets were Team Champions at the Jaguar Invitational, the 48<sup>th</sup> annual McT Relays, and the Section 1 6A Championships. Filling out the scoring roster were St. Ignatius 8<sup>th</sup> grader Ebie Douglas who finished 18<sup>th</sup> overall at the 6A State Championships, freshmen Sarah Glover and Mary Rehm, and senior Iliana Garcia who consistently finished in the top 5 for the team. Carmen was selected as the Optimist Club Cross Country Runner of the Year as well as the Mobile Press Registers Female Cross Country Runner of the Year. She has also been selected as Gatorade's Alabama Girls Cross Country Runner of the Year for the second consecutive year. The Gatorade Company, in collaboration with ESPN, announced Carmen as its 2010-2011 winner. Last year, Carmen was the first Gatorade Alabama Girls Cross Country Runner of the Year to be chosen from McGill-Toolen, now she has won her second title.

## Boys Cross Country

The boy's Cross Country team dominated Old Shell Road this season as well as the area competition. Lead by senior team captain Philip Dempsey, the boys won the annual McT/UMS dual meet opener and then continued that success by winning the Foley Invitational, the Jaguar Invitational and the Elite Division of the Mobile Challenge of Champions Invitational. The boys' team had 7 runners under 17:45 with Dempsey leading the team with a personal best of 16:34. Consistently scoring for the team were sophomores Cameron Ellis, Conrad Collins and Timmy Aguirre, junior Jordan Poche and seniors Garrison Carlos and Jamie Friedlander. The boys' team depth helped them win the Mobile County Championships as well as the Section 1 Site B Championship. They improved upon last years 8<sup>th</sup> place finish at state to an impressive 5<sup>th</sup> place finish. Philip Dempsey was selected as the 2010 6A Cross Country Runner of the Year for the Downtown Optimist Club and was also a member of the Press Registers Super 7 along with teammate Cameron Ellis. The boys' team also had 7 runners selected for the Mobile All-County team, more than any other school.

## Varsity Boys Basketball

It is basketball season and the Yellow Jackets are in the midst of area play. This year's team has reloaded with a large crop of talented freshman, sophomores and juniors. We have three seniors back that have seen significant varsity playing time. Twelve of the fifteen on the Varsity squad have seen their first action as Varsity players. We are young, but are a talented group that has shown great promise. To this point in the season we are 9-8 and 1-1 in the area and we have continued to grow with each passing day.

This year's schedule has included many old faces as well as some new. Our Yellow Jackets hosted and won their annual Tip-Off Tournament November 11th and 13th, with wins over Jackson High School and Cottage Hill Christian. They also competed in the Baker Thanksgiving Tournament and finished as Runner-Up to host Baker with wins over Fairhope and UMS-Wright. They competed in the Robertsdale Christmas Tournament as well, with wins over Sidney Lanier High School and Robertsdale High School.

## St. Thomas Aquinas Program Update

This academic year McGill-Toolen Catholic High School began a new curriculum called The St. Thomas Aquinas Program. The twenty-eight freshman students in this new program were chosen based upon their superior grades and excellent standardized test scores. As these students matriculate through McGill-Toolen, they will take the PSAT each year, prepare extra projects and enroll in the highest-level courses that the school offers. This year, the students participated in the EXPLORE standardized test program, and all Aquinas Scholars scored in the 97th percentile or higher.

Mr. Gary Blackburn, the Aquinas Program Director and Assistant Principal, stated that the St. Thomas Aquinas Program has a bright future at McGill- Toolen. Next semester, he will work with the students on PSAT preparation. He will also review applications and records of current eighth graders to determine qualifications for entering the program next year. As the scholars advance through their four years at McGill, they will study famous church leaders, engage in challenging outside reading, and as they approach their junior and senior years, they will participate in college tours. Through the Aquinas curriculum, students will continue to explore their Catholic faith in more depth through service to others and in their religion courses. As the program grows each year, more teachers and administrators will work specifically with this group of students to challenge them in every subject. The main objective of the St. Thomas Aquinas program, says Mr. Blackburn, is to prepare the students for a rigorous honors curriculum at the collegiate level.

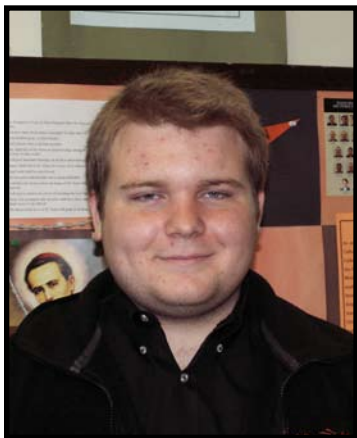

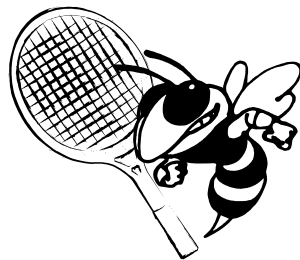
